

## **TREASURER'S REPORT** by Ralph Patford

### **Last Financial Year**

Financially the VMRG ended last year in good shape. We were left with a balance of \$4579, having spent \$5136 of our \$9715 income. Almost \$3000 of the balance is set aside for database redesign and will be spent in the not too distant future. ## **This Financial Year**

Parks Victoria has approved a grant in excess of \$7000 for this financial year and memberships are up around 50 already. Consequently, we will have enough funds to meet our modest requirements during this financial year. Establishment and on-going expenses related to the new website were not budgeted for but will be met from last year's surplus. We will also use the surplus to fund Ron and Gwyn Wiseman to complete a magnificent malleefowl video.

## **National Malleefowl Forum**

We have opened a separate account and established Merchant Facilities with our bank, allowing us to accept credit card payments. Sponsorship is now approaching \$20 000. A number of promotional items will be available, some for the National Forum and some for the VMRG.

## **Special Status Applications**

We will continue to press our claims for Tax Exempt status and Deductible Gift Recipient status. The former may be more easily gained than the latter, but we will persist.

## **New Members**

If you know of anyone who may be interested in joining VMRG let me know and I will send them a form. Annual membership is \$25 per household or \$15 per individual, and Membership and General Interest Brochures are currently being produced and will be available before the National Forum.

## **Notes on Monitoring** by Ann Stokie.

All of the data is now in.  
The number of active mounds is up on last year but they are patchy.  
Bronzewing and Wandown are very good.  
The Sunset grids do not show the same results. There are far fewer fox scats than in the recent past and the herbs have become 'lots' in many cases.  
Thanks to everyone for the great data. It is all stored safely on my computer and backed up on compact discs.

## **Random jottings from field notes**

**Bronzewing:** -nest 45 – active with branch on SW side of mound. Small bird's nest in adjacent shrub at ground level lined with malleefowl feathers. Nest 73 – a massive active nest covered in large pieces of limestone and debris (Neil & Ross)

**Colignan:** -There is a beautiful lost lerp tool just inside the grid near the 0.5 baseline red reflector. If found, please return to Peter Stokie. (Ann Stokie)

**Torpeys:** -We camped in Wathe just near an active nest, (outside our grid). We were fortunate to witness egg laying on two occasions early in the morning before we went out to monitor. (Ann & Ron)

**Washing Machine:** -Last year's promising nests were untouched with the litter rotting and collapsing. One lonely malleefowl walked across a nest on the morning we visited it. The grid appears to be suffering due to the drought. We noticed an increased number of goats. (Noel & Anne)

**One Tree Plain:** -No lerp tools were observed on the ground at any of our stopping points, and only a few lerp tools were observed on the leaves of some trees. (Peter & June)

**Wathe:** -What a nest is no. 32. The birds have shifted this nest giving it the appearance of a double nest. As we were preparing to leave, a large bird came rushing by. We moved away and up he came to the nest. Never seen so many lizard tracks on malleefowl nests. (Ron & Gwyn)

Birds fantastic – king quail, rainbow bird,  
white naped honeyeater, willy wagtail,  
masked wood swallow, bronzewing pigeon,  
and white browed babblers. (Liz & Gil)

**Dennyng:** - We met Graham Hannig  
(Walpeup) trucking wheat from the family  
farm. He gave us the location of a new nest  
in the grid, which he had shown us last year.  
Whilst I was talking to him, Wendy took a ride  
in the new \$300,000 harvester down and  
back the length of the paddock. (Ralph)

**South Bore:** -Would take an elephant to  
make a dint in the crust of this mound.
