Conservation genetics of Malleefowl

- August update from Taneal Cope

Things have been progressing with my project, with a lot of time being spent inside the genetics lab and not enough time in the sunshine!

Since I last saw VMRG members, I have been in the lab extracting DNA from samples and testing different primers on Malleefowl DNA. At this point I am at Melbourne University extracting DNA from the 200 tissue/blood samples that have been collected by the SA museum. I will be extracting DNA from the VMRG feather samples using Ancient DNA Techniques (usually applied to old, decaying samples such as fossils). This process ensures that minute amounts of DNA are able to be extracted. I'm planning a trip to the Ancient DNA laboratory facilities in Adelaide around September/ October this year.

At the moment, I am also trying to sequence mitochondrial DNA in Malleefowl from WA, SA and Vic to see what level of genetic difference there is across the country. Mitochondria have their own DNA that evolves much slower than the rest of the body's DNA. So, by looking at differences in mitochondria we are able to track ancestry and historical relationships. At the moment this is a pilot study, meaning that I'm testing only a few individuals to begin with. I'm trying out new primers that will hopefully allow me to be able to classify structure in populations of Malleefowl.

Other than that, I am busy with ethics applications and plans for the field season. Field work will involve catching, banding and blood sampling adult Malleefowl; digging up mounds; potentially incubating some Malleefowl eggs; and sampling end of season mounds (for eggs that are

not going to catch or survive). As the plans develop further I will be able to send out requests for volunteers for some of these catching trips.

Funds for fuel - a change of

nomenclature by Ralph Patford, Treasurer

Since its inception VMRG has been trying to meet some fuel costs associated with monitoring and attendance at Committee meetings. Many thousands of kilometres are racked up each year by volunteers. Currently, the estimate is that members collectively spend in excess of \$4,000 per year in monitoring alone. This does not include travel to the Training Weekend, Reporting Back Meeting and other activities such as Grid Searches. The overall figure is likely to be at least twice that. VMRG does not have the resources to reimburse all costs, hence the current policy of providing funds to those who request them, to cover some of the fuel costs of monitoring and attendance at Committee meetings. In hindsight, the use of the term 'fuel reimbursement' is a bit misleading, so from now on the term 'fuel subsidy' will be used. This should convey a more accurate notion of what the policy is about. The actual dollar amounts remain unchanged, ie. for monitoring a subsidy equal to the cost of fuel to a maximum of \$80 for 2WD vehicles and \$120 for 4WD vehicles where they are necessary, and for Committee meetings a maximum of \$80.

Re-search at Wathe Reserve

On Sunday April 19 a group of Hopetoun and District Pre-School parents and friends along with members of the Victorian Malleefowl Recovery Group re-searched the 03 grid at Wathe Reserve. The grids are re-searched every four to five years to check if there have been any new mounds built in that time or if some may have been missed when the initial search was done.

We divided into three teams of 8 searchers with VMRG members at each end of the line. The volunteers were spaced at 20m intervals and guided from each end with walkers holding palm computers connected to a GPS. As each mound was found (whether new or known) it was recorded on the palm computer and a GPS location recorded as well. At lunch time the walkers had covered 4km and everyone was able to partake of chicken and salads with fruit salad and tea, coffee for dessert.

The afternoon was getting quite warm as they set off on the final walk with tired legs. They all finished the re-search around 4.30pm.

VMRG Committee by Gil Hopkins

Treasurer Ralph Patford reported a balance of \$61,375.24 which includes various committed but unspent amounts totalling \$35,703.56.

Peter Stokie discussed the training weekend and we changed some of the arrangements so we could participate in the 100 year celebrations for Wyperfeld National Park on the Sunday. New arrangements will include some monitoring practice facilities on the Saturday morning for anyone who could be there by Friday night.

Some new data loggers will be purchased. VMRG will celebrate its 10th anniversary in 2010.

Discussed site re-searches and possibility of 'participating' in monitoring site establishment at Scotia Sanctuary in NSW.

EnviroFund project finishes in September with some meetings near Malleefowl monitoring sites and development of Malleefowl information CDs.

VMRG Education Kit was a runner-up in the Banksia environmental awards. VMRG monitoring safety procedures have been entered into Safer Communities Award process.

Still in discussion with Iluka regarding funding of Malleefowl projects near mineral-sand mines near Ouyen, waiting for Government decisions.

Major funds and partnerships are being sought to implement the Adaptive Management Framework for Malleefowl, and grants are being sought for monitoring, some more equipment, and computer, website and database improvement.

VMRG Reporting Back meeting

VMRG held a very successful reporting back meeting on April 4 at the DPI building in Mildura. It was reported that this breeding season was one of the most successful for many years. But there were a couple of reasons for this including more monitoring sites, better winter rains, and also some of the grids have had fires close to or through them. Two thirds of Wathe FF Reserve burnt in 2007 and Malleefowl from the burnt area seem to have moved into the unburnt section, so there are more active nests in our sites.

The afternoon speaker was Taneal Cope who is doing a three year study at Melbourne University on Malleefowl genetics. This involves the collection of feathers for lab testing to find out if in-breeding is a problem, if all eggs in a mound are from the same parents, and other relationships. It was an interesting presentation!

Dr Joe Benshemesh reported on Malleefowl monitoring results and also the Adaptive Management process that the Arthur Rylah Institute are doing for the Group.

Some of our members visited the Australian Inland Botanical Gardens near Buronga NSW for a very enjoyable walk through the Mallee section with plants indigenous to the Mallee area.



Extracts from 2008/9 monitoring

Active nests in seven sites over 21 years
Another excellent year of monitoring with great
success and very high standards, and the most
active mounds ever recorded, 151 out of 1169!

It was the first year of monitoring all known mounds in the Wedderburn area, where line searching is now needed to find all mounds in all reserves.

We moved to a new version of Cybertracker which will allow us to upgrade our failing Palm computers with newer equipment.

We set up an on-line database to hold all Australian monitoring data safely and accurately, and yet accessible to those using it. There are 4 roles – contributors (monitors), coordinators (State representatives), ecologists (who vet data and prepare reports), and administrator (who organises the computer management).

Lerp were recorded at 7% of mounds.

We are moving toward further development of a national program of adaptive management plans for recovery of Malleefowl populations and are making partnerships and seeking funding.

Monitors have access to data for their monitoring sites. They can review their data for every mound, view any comments, and soon be able to see the photos taken. They can also see 'Mound Inspection Reports' for **every** site on the database.
